The present Technical Regulations Rulebook is the Official version, written in the Official WorldSkate language: English. In this document, the masculine gender is used in relation to all the World Skate Individuals. Quantity is written by letter and (by number). Example: *two* (2).

2. TECHNICAL COMMISSION

2. Speed Technical Commission

2.1 Definition

The Speed Technical Commission (STC) is a Technical Commission of the World Skate Europe.

9. STC Disciplinary Commission

- 9.1 For all European competitions supervised by the Technical Commission, the Technical Commission members shall constitute the Disciplinary Commission. There must be at least three (3) present people
- 9.2 When only one (1) or two (2) members are present to constitute the Disciplinary Commission, a second or third person, selected by the Technical Commission Chairperson among the Official Delegates of the participating countries, is (are) added to the Commission
- 9.3 In international competitions where there are no Technical Commission Members, the Local Organizing Committee constitutes a Disciplinary Commission composed of three (3) representatives from the Delegates of participating countries.
- 9.4 The decision of appeal taken by the Disciplinary Commission is final.

10. Other business

- 10.1 All National Federations, Continental Areas shall forward within three (3) months after the beginning of the new season in every country, a list of all the clubs involved in inline speed skating. Furthermore, they shall send to the Technical Commission the official results of their Junior and Senior national championships.
- 10.2 The organizers of important European competitions such as Championships, Cups, etc. shall send to the Technical Commission the program and maps relative to such competitions within sixty (60) days before they start. The Technical Commission will issue, when approved, a specific authorization.
- 10.3 All National Federations that issued magazines and newsletter on inline speed skating shall send a copy of every issue to the Technical Commission.
- 10.4 Technical Commission minutes, letters and copies of administrative documents or any other document shall be kept by the Chairman. Such documents shall be given to his successor.
- 10.5 The Technical Commission will settle matters, which are not included in this Rulebook.

3. INTERNATIONAL OFFICIALS

11. Officials

The international officials are:

- 11.1 World Skate Europe President, World Skate Europe Vice President and World Skate Europe Secretary General;
- 11.2 Chairmen of the European Technical Commissions and Technical Commission members.

12. The Delegate

- 12.1 Nation or Team's delegates who have been officially appointed by the participating countries is responsible of its delegation and must behave according to the principles of sports honesty and fair play.
- 12.2 For European Inline Speed Skating Championship, World Skate Europe accredits two (2) Official Delegates per nation.

13. Coaches

- 13.1 The nation or team's coaches are not officials. They are not allowed to represent their team or their country in any official approach.
- 13.2 A specific area called "Coaches area" located near the race course is reserved for them.

14. Officials of the Competition

The officials of the competition are:

- 14.1 The Jury composed of judges and the Chief Judge;
- 14.2 The Official Speaker, he is allowed inside the race course;
- 14.3 The Doping Control Officer (DCO) and Chaperone as defined in the WORLD SKATE Anti-Doping Rules.

15. Judges - Composition of the Jury and tasks

The World Technical Commission Referee in Chief, in accordance with the Chairperson, must appoint, organize, register all International Speed Judges in the world, and verify their activity.

16. Technical Commission Rights

- 16.1 To guarantee the uniform interpretation and application of the Rulebook and any other directions issued by Technical Commission for the European Speed Championships and all other international competitions.
- 16.2 To point out to the National Federations, any particular lack of proper performance of judging duties during a championship or international event, recommending or not their appointment to international competitions.

17. Availability of International Judges

- 17.1 Each year by January 31st, every National Federation must send to the Technical Commission a list of its working International Judges. Such Judges shall renew their category, their card every year and pay the fee established by World Skate.
- 17.2 Only International Judges recognized by the Technical Commission and registered for the current year can be appointed as members of the Jury for the World or international Championships. In the absence of a sufficient number of recognized International Judges, National Judges may be used to assist the Jury.
- 17.3 It is mandatory to follow World Skate Academy Judge's Seminar to maintain the international category (renewal every two years). If a Judge does not fulfill this requirement, his commission will be revoked and he must retake the exam if willing to have a new commission.
- 17.4 National Federations must communicate to the Technical Commission the names of their international Judges who have been suspended, expelled or for any reasons have interrupted their activity.

18. Chief Judge

An International Judge Category Level III, who speaks fluently the Official World Skate language and who, in the opinion of the Technical Commission Referee in Chief, has already demonstrated in previous World or Continental Championships to be able to carry out perfectly all the tasks included in a Jury, can be the Chief Judge of an International competition.

19. Examination of International Judges

- 19.1 World Skate organizes the examination of the Jury with the support of the Technical Commission.

- 19.2 Each candidate must have officiated at least for two (2) years at the maximum category in his country. Such candidates must be fluent in the official language of World Skate: English.
- 19.3 Proposed candidates will be examined by a Technical Commission member and an experienced International Judge, (at least one of them belonging to a different nation from the one of the candidates) as follows:
- a. Two (2) hours written test of about the knowledge of the Speed discipline's Technical Regulations.
 - b. Oral test of twenty (20) minutes about the knowledge of the Speed discipline. The capacity to understand and speak the official language (English) is evaluated.
 - c. Candidates who succeed the World Skate two (2) tests will be observed and evaluated in their capacity as judge in the different tasks of the Jury.
 - d. Candidates who pass such exams will be registered International Judges, only after having taken the World Skate Academy for Speed Judges, and can be convened for international competitions.
- 19.4 The fee for the inscription at the International Judge examination is 100 US\$.

20. Withdrawal of International qualification

- 20.1 If an International Judge does not officiate at national or international levels for three (3) consecutive years, his commission will be revoked. He must retake the exam if willing to have a new commission.
- 20.2 If an International Judge is not up-to-date with the payment of international fees, after three (3) years his commission will be revoked. He must retake the exam if willing to have a new commission.
- 20.3 If an International Judge Category Level III or Level II ceases to be active nationally for two years, he will be downgraded to Category Level I and will be required to undergo a retest to regain such recognition of Category Level III or Level II.

21. Registration fee for International Judge

The National Federations have to pay a fee of the registration of their International Judges.

22. List of International Judges

Every year the Technical Commission Referee in Chief communicates to National Federations, Continental Areas, an updated list of the available International Judges and their current category levels.

23. International Judges Level Categories

There is currently only one International Category: International Judge with levels III, II and I International Chief Judge is the nomination for a specific international competition, art 18.

23.1 World Skate Speed - International Judges Level III (***)

An International Judge Level III:

- a. Renews annually his category, his card and pays the fee established by World Skate.
- b. Participates annually in the World Skate Academy Judge’s Seminar.
- c. Demonstrates a high performance in the World Skate Academy test and gets a grade of more than 80%.
- d. Is fluent in the official language of World Skate: English.
- e. Is active nationally and maintains international standards.
- f. Is a lecturer in update Speed discipline’s international or national seminars.

23.2 World Skate Speed - International Judges Level II (**)

An International Judge Level II:

- a. Renews annually his category, his card and pays the fee established by World Skate.
- b. Participates in the World Skate Academy Judge’s Seminar at least every two years.
- c. Demonstrates a high performance in the World Skate Academy test and gets a grade of more than 60%.

- d. Understands and speaks the official language of World Skate: English.
- e. Is active nationally and maintains international standards.
- f. Is a lecturer in update Speed discipline's international or national seminars.

23.3 World Skate Speed - International Judges Level I (*).

An International Judge Level I:

- a. He annually renews his category, his card and pays the fee established by World Skate.
- b. Participates in the World Skate Academy Judge's Seminar at least every two years.
- c. Passes the World Skate Academy test.
- d. Understands and speaks the official language of World Skate: English.
- e. Is active nationally and maintains international standards.
- f. Is a lecturer in update Speed discipline's international or national seminars.

24. Employment of International Judges

24.1 For international competitions, with the participation of at least two (2) different continents, the organizing country can arrange the composition of the Jury with other participating nations, but shall request the Technical Commission to indicate and appoint the Chief Judge.

24.2 If willing to bear all relative expenses, the organizing country may apply to the Technical Commission for the appointment of a Chief Judge and other International Judges belonging to non-participating countries (but as near as possible to the site of the competition).

25. Restrictions - Honorary judges

25.1 All International Judges must retire at their seventieth (70) birthday.

25.2 International Judges who have achieved the age limit of seventy (70) years old and have successfully carried out their international activity for at least ten (10) years may be appointed by the Technical Commission as "Honorary Judges" receiving a proper digital Certificate, upon proposal of the Federations to which they belong.

25.3 International Judges having relatives participating in the World or Continental Championships or who are trainers or managers of participating skaters must be excluded, if possible, from the Jury. If there are appointed judges in such situation, they will have to present their reasons to the Chief Judge who will consider their position in the assignment of tasks.

26. Duties of International Judges

- 26.1 International Judges appointed to World Speed Championships or international competitions must respect and strictly enforce all regulations and other rules issued by the Technical Commission without any reference to their own country.
- 26.2 All Judges must respect the World Skate General Rules and World Skate General Competition Rules. Art 214.
- 26.3 International judges have to follow World Skate Academy Judge's Seminar to maintain the international category (renewal every two years). If a Judge does not fulfill this requirement, his commission will be revoked and he must retake the exam if willing to have a new commission.
- 26.4 Each year by January 31st such Judges shall renew their category level, their card and pay the fee established by World Skate.
- 26.5 The Technical Commission can punish an International Judge for violating the present Rulebook. This can be done by means of warning, suspensions of one year or a final removal from the roster.
- 26.6 Disciplinary measures taken against Judges by National Federations, Continental Areas are definitely recognized as valid and applicable also by the Technical Commission.

4. INTERNATIONAL SKATERS

27. Nationality

Skaters taking part in an international competition and competing for their National Federation must prove that they have the passport of the same country.

A skater who participated in a continental or World Inline Speed Skating Championship representing a country and changed his nationality or having double nationality or more passports cannot represent another country in 2Continental or World Inline Speed Skating Championship if three (3) years have not elapsed from his last participation representing his previous country. Rule 42 of IOC Olympic Chart.

28. Categories gender

In conformity with IOC guidelines, World Skate is entitled to conduct some tests on specific occasions. This would mean laboratory tests could be done if there is a suspicion that a skater is competing in the wrong category. (World Skate Medical Regulation Chapter B Paragraph 1 to 3).

29. Age

All limit of age established in these rules are to be considered at December 31st of the year of the competition. There are five (5) recognized categories; Cadet, Youth, Junior, Senior and Master.

29.1 A Cadet skater is aged 13 or 14 at December 31st of the year of the competition.

A Youth skater is aged 15 or 16 at December 31st of the year of the competition.

A Junior skater is aged 17 or 18 at December 31st of the year of the competition.

A Senior skater is aged 19 at December 31st of the year of the competition.

Master categories ages are:

Under 40 (up to 39),

Under 50 (40 to 49),

Under 60 (50 to 59),

60 and more

- 29.2 A cadet aged 14 at December 31st of the year of the competition can participate in the European Championships in the Youth category.
- 29.3 A Youth aged 16 at December 31st of the year of the competition can participate in the European Championships in the Junior category.
- 29.4 A Junior aged 18 at December 31st of the year of the competition can participate in the European Championships in the Senior category.
- 29.5 A senior skater having participated at Master Continental or World Inline Speed Skating Championship shall not participate to any other Senior Championship.
- 29.6 Minimum age to compete in a European Inline Speed Skating Championship is fourteen (14) years at December 31st of the year of the championship.

5. INTERNATIONAL COMPETITIONS

5.1 International Events sanctioned by World Skate Europe

World Skate Europe may sanction and/or recognize events organized by different bodies or entities, providing those events with dignity of official World Skate Europe recognized events. These events shall be included in World Skate Europe Events Calendar. Sanctioned events are international events not organized directly by World Skate Europe.

Here below the procedure to follow for the sanctioning by World Skate Europe.

An official request must be sent to Secretary General by email (europe@worldskate.org) specifying mandatory information:

- a. Name of the event
- b. Discipline
- c. Location, city/country
- d. Days of the event
- e. Typology of the event (Continental event, World Event...)
- f. Number of Participants Esteemed
- g. Number International Judges/Referees
- h. Competition Format and Schedule
- i. Which will be the award provided for the competition (Medals, Trophies or Price money)
- j. As Sports Department receives the info requested, they will be sent to the Technical Commission for the approval of the Chairman. In the case of the positive answer, Sports Department will send the Terms & Conditions.

30. Organizer

Only the Technical Commission, National Federations, Associations and Clubs associated with these can organize official international competitions. No Federation or Club, which in some way is part of the World Skate structure, may participate in any privately organized international competition, or in any competition organized by groups not belonging to World Skate.

31. Championships

European and National Championships of the same sports discipline can be organized only once a year. The winners of each competition are the official holders of the title until the following competition of the same kind.

32. Approval

National Championships, competitions and criteria organized within the recognized National Federation in which only members of those organizations can participate, do not need the Technical Commission approval.

33. European fees

Fees for European competition; see Annex 1.

34. Fees payment

34.1 The official World Skate Europe currency is the Euro (EUR).

34.2 Fees are directly paid to World Skate Europe using bank transfer; it must be free of charge for the World Skate Europe. If such charges subsist, they will be presented for payment at the Federation.

35. Authorization for interclub/interregional competition

The Federation, association or private bodies organizing intercontinental competitions must have World Skate Europe authorization by sending program ninety (90) days before its beginning. World Skate Europe will grant corresponding authorization if all requirements (including the payment of the organizing fee) have been fulfilled. World Skate Europe logo must be in all advertisements and printings of the competition.

36. Official competition

Races on road or track can be organized by all the different National Federations for all the recognized categories.

37. Official World Skate Europe calendar

All intercontinental competitions must be authorized by World Skate Europe. Confederation and Federations affiliated to World Skate Europe must send the planning of their competition of the next year at least by December 15, so that World Skate Europe may draw up the official calendar.

38. Communication for competition

The communication of any competition must include the following information:

- a. place, program and duration;
- b. whether the tracks are indoor or outdoor, condition of the track (World Skate Europe standard, material and dimensions), facility capacity;
- c. deadline for entry;
- d. entry fee for participant;

- e. possibility of training on the racing course;
- f. number of Federations invited and number of judges for each country;
- g. expenses to be met by organizers for the travel and stay of skaters and judges of each Federation;
- h. specification of organizer's responsibility with regard to possible accidents;
- i. specification of first Aid facilities and availability of the doctor in case of serious accidents;
- j. list of awards.

39. Modification

Should it be necessary to postpone a competition, the organizer shall promptly notify the new date to each participant. World Skate Europe must also be informed. Entries that have been already submitted remain valid unless otherwise notified.

40. Participation

Only skaters being member of affiliated Federations or Confederation can participate in international competitions approved by World Skate Europe.

41. Registration

- 41.1 All skater registrations must contain: surname, name, date of birth, nationality and gender;
- 41.2 **European Championship:** the participation application must be in writing and must be signed by the applying National Federation.
- 41.3 **European Cup:** the participation application must be done via the official World Skate Europe web site; European Cup organizers receive the application data from the European Cup webmaster.
- 41.4 **East European Cup:** the participation application must be done via the official web site; East European Cup organizers receive the application data from the European Cup webmaster.

42. Results & Reports

National Federations and Confederations, Club and organizers shall send to the Technical Commission a written report - including results - about National and Continental Championships organized by them.

43. Anti-Doping rules

Concerning the doping control, WADA and World Skate Anti-Doping Rules will be observed.

5.2 European Inline Speed Skating Championship

Section 1. Organization rules

44. Definition

There are three (3) European Inline Speed Skating Championships. One (1) on track, one (1) on Road (including marathon for Juniors and Seniors), and one marathon for Masters.

45. Participation

45.1 European Inline Speed Skating Championships are open to all the national teams of the Federations which are members of World Skate Europe, who have regularly paid their fees and have given confirmation of their participation according to the terms established by the Technical Commission.

45.2 The national Federation must confirm its participation thirty (30) days before the beginning of the European Inline Speed Skating.

45.3 All the skaters must be members of their National Federation and must be covered by a federal or personal insurance.

46. Withdraw of a Federation

46.1 Each country that decides to withdraw after submitting an entry must notify the Technical Commission and the Local Organizing Committee of this decision no later than ten (10) days prior to the beginning of the Championships.

46.2 If, upon examination, the withdrawal is considered unjustified, the World Skate Europe will fine the Federation in question for the inconvenience.

47. Candidature

Candidature for the organization of the European Inline Speed Skating Championships must be presented to World Skate Europe.

48. Organizing Federation responsibilities

49. Information to the participating countries

See European Inline Speed Skating Championships Event Manual

50. Broadcast charges

See European Inline Speed Skating Championships Event Manual

51. Anti-doping charges

The organizing Federation must provide and pay for the doping controls according to what set by the World Skate Antidoping Rules.

52. Nomination of the Jury & Chief Judge

52.1 The constitution of the Jury and the designation of the Chief Judge is decided by the Referee in Chief in accordance with the Technical Commission Chairperson, and based on the Judges' current category levels. This will be informed to the Chief Judge at least ninety (90) days prior to the competition.

52.2 To be nominated, Judges have to be active nationally, to have maintained international standards and to have followed World Skate Academy Judge's Seminar.

53. Jury

The Technical Commission Referee in Chief, in accordance with the Chairperson, appoints by means of a letter, by the Sports Department, nine (9) level III International Judges belonging to different countries and three (3) judges from the host country. Furthermore, he shall ask, according to the needs, other level II or level I International Judges to complete the Jury. The Organizing Committee will be responsible for travel, board and lodging expenses.

54. Preparatory meeting

A technical meeting is scheduled 24 hours before the beginning of the World Inline Speed Skating Championship. The agenda includes:

- Welcome of the Technical Commission Chairman;
- Information from the Chairman of the Local Organizing Committee;
- Designation of the Chief Judge and the Jury;
- Technical information about the European Inline Speed Skating Championships (modification of schedule, heats, etc.)

55. Podium.

55.1 The winner of each Championship race is named Champion of that race distance and holds the title until the following Championship.

55.2 World Skate Europe shall supply the jerseys for all the winning senior skaters only.

55.3 The first, second and third place winners of each Championship race receive gold, silver and bronze medals, supplied by World Skate Europe.

55.4 Skaters must wear their racing suit and their skates during the award presentations. Cap and sunglasses are forbidden.

55.5 If a skater is not present for the podium ceremony and this has to be postponed, the skater loses his medal for the general rankings (individual & nation) art 70.

56. Official Results

All the European Championships results will be uploaded on the World Skate Europe webpage, in the section relating to the championship in question.

Section 2. Competition rules

57. Composition

European Inline Speed Skating Championships are divided as follows:

- Youth, Junior & Senior: men and women on track
- Youth, Junior & Senior: men and women on road

58. Frequency

The European Inline Speed Skating Championships are organized every year, in accordance with the Technical Commission and World Skate Europe Regulations.

59. Programming

The European Inline Speed Skating Championships are organized in accordance with the Technical Commission, World Skate Europe and the Organizer, with the following possible program:

This programming can be object of modifications, based on the local specific conditions. For example, European Championship on road circuit can be first.

60. Official distances for European Championships

61. Program

61.1 The Official Program for European Inline Speed Skating Championships is released during the year of the Championships.

61.2 The Organizer of the European Championships has the possibility to propose a different program, but it is up to the Technical Commission to decide the final official version.

61.3 The race distances valid for the European Championships are established in art 60. Should the need arise to reduce or modify the races, as a result of exceptional circumstances, the Technical Commission members are then to decide which races to cancel.

61.4 There will be no losers' finals at the European Inline Speed Skating Championships.

61.5 For television requests, the Technical Commission can change the program and the initial schedule during the European Championships.

61.6 The Technical Commission has the power to modify the program for any sports or technical reasons.

62. Training program

62.1 Organizing Federation establishes the schedule of training times, under the control of the Technical Commission.

62.2 Track and Road circuit must be available for free trainings at least three (3) days before the beginning of the European Championships.

63. Country Quotas & Registration

63.1 For Senior European Inline Speed Skating Championship, each country may enter a total of eight (8) male skaters and a total of eight (8) female skaters on both championships; track and road circuit.

63.2 For Junior European Inline Speed Skating Championship, each country may enter a total of eight (8) male skaters and a total of eight (8) female skaters on both championships; track and road circuit.

63.3 For youth European Inline Speed Skating Championship, each country may enter a total of eight (8) male skaters and a total of eight (8) female skaters on both championships; track and road circuit.

63.4 Each country can register a maximum of sixteen (16) female skaters and sixteen (16) male skaters to take part in the Marathon race.

Within the sixteen (16) female skaters and sixteen (16) male skaters it is possible to enter two (2) female skaters and two (2) male skaters who were not entered in track and road races.

Each nation can allow its skaters to add a logo of their own sponsor on the race suit.

63.5 Three (3) skaters only from each country may take part in each race of the European Inline Speed Skating Championships.

63.6 Three (3) or four (4) skaters from each country may be registered in relay race.

64. Entry form

64.1 The Federation must fill the Technical Commission official form before paying the fees. It will preregister race by race the name of the skaters participating at the Speed Skating European Championship. The preregistration must be sent at Technical Commission office fifteen (15) days before the beginning of the European Championships (opening ceremony).

- 64.2 The Federation must send the ID photo for each member of the delegation. The photo must be in color and in JPG file.
- 64.3 The Federation's delegate can modify the pre-registration. Only preregistered skaters can be changed, supplementary registration cannot be done. Modification must be done at the Technical Commission office the day before the concerned race. The time limit to give this modification is within twenty (20) minutes of the end of races of the day. The modification must be done using the Technical Commission official form. If no modification is done, preregistration will be considered as official inscription.
- 64.4 If the Technical Commission accepts a late registration during the European Championship, the skater is not allowed to race before the following day of his registration.
- 64.5 When a registered skater is suspended (art 181), he cannot be replaced by a teammate.
- 64.6 An injured skater can be replaced by a teammate until the call of the Chief Judge for the call area. The Delegate must present a medical certification with the official form. The injured athlete will not be allowed to race until the end of the European Championship.

65. Federation & Athlete Participation Fees

The federation and athlete registration fee: see Annex 1.

66. European Inline Speed Skating Championship Fees

Fees to be paid by the organizing Federation for European Championships: see Annex 1.

67. Organizing Federation charges

See European speed championship - Event Manual

68. Organizing Federation Technical charges

68.1 Timekeeping charges.

As stipulated in art 88.d of the World Skate Speed Technical Commission Rulebook the timekeeping must be supplied by an automatic timekeeping basing of the use of transponders and electronic photo finish.

68.2 Times and ranking information.

The Organizing Federation is in charge to provide the corresponding electronic equipment and be able to provide the following times and information

displayed on a large screen board:

- a. 200m/300m (track) for each skater:
 - the intermediate time every one hundred (100) meters and the difference with the best time;
 - the final time, the intermediate ranking;
 - the composition of the final.
- b. 500m +D (track) & One lap (road circuit):
 - the ranking of each race;
 - the composition of the next round, provided by the Jury.
- c. 1.000m (track):
 - the time of each lap, the final time of each skater;
 - the composition of the next round provided by the Jury.
- d. Points race:
 - The result of each sprint (first and second skaters);
 - The intermediate ranking with the sum of points for at least the five (5) first skaters.
- e. Elimination races
The result of each elimination
- f. Marathon race:
According to the race course, transponders-based system check points must be installed to determine the skaters' accomplishment of the distance and therefore the ranking order.

68.3 Warm up.

A skating area of warming-up must be provided to the skaters. This zone is situated near the village of the skaters and possibly contains a direct and reserved access to the venue of competition (track and road circuit).

68.4 For European Championships, the organizer must provide an official video recording.

69. European Ranking

69.1 For European Inline Speed Skating Championships, the rankings per country are calculated by adding the medals. The World Skate criteria is the number of gold medals, the second criteria the number of silver medals and third criteria the number of bronze medals. If nations have the same number of medals with one of these criteria, the following procedure is used to rank them.

- 69.2 For the countries without medals, the ranking is established adding the points obtained in each event, excluding Relays and Marathon. Skaters placed first in each race obtain a number of points equal to the number of skaters who took part in that race; skaters placed second obtain one (1) point less; those placed third two (2) points less; and so on till the skater placed last who obtains only one (1) point.
- 69.3 For long distance races (10km & 15km), there is no loser final. According with the total of skaters participating in the race, the unqualified skaters keep the points obtained in qualification heat.
- 69.4 Disqualified skaters for sports or disciplinary faults (DQ-SF / DQ-DF) do not receive any point.
- 69.5 At the end of the European Championships, twelve (12) European rankings per nation are established as follows:

5.3 European Cup

71. Specific rules for the European Cup

The European Cup is an official European series of the WSE. This series has its own regulations and applies the ESTC technical rules.

71.1 Duration

Days of competition: three (maximum) for each event.

71.2 Participation

- All European skaters provided they are authorized by their corresponding National Federation which is affiliated to the World Skate Europe;
- All skaters from other Continental Federations affiliated with WSE may participate in the Euro Cup (on invitation by the organizers)
Participants may find details for entries on the EC website (link to each organizer/website): <http://www.europeancupinline.eu/>
- central registration;
- unique EC ID;
- Fees to be paid by bank transfer as indicated.

71.3 Categories

Categories: Cadet, Youth, Junior and Senior.

71.4 Event Organization

1. Organizers are authorized to use World Skate Europe logo and must hoist World Skate Europe flag in the sports venue.
2. The WSESTC will attend every event with its own delegate, one (1) delegate at the final event, being the board and lodging expenses up to the local organizer.
3. Board and lodging expenses of other World Skate Europe attending members will be Technical Commission responsibility.
4. An official representative of the national federation has to be present at the stage.
5. Insurance: each participant must have his own personal insurance. At the same time, organizers too must have an insurance against third party.
6. Website: each organization must have its own website containing details about the event (proper application with entries, hotels, features of the track, modalities of entries, type of races, etc.).
7. The World Skate Europe provides a template for the announcement of the stage. The template must be used by the organizer (unity of announcements and in accordance with the rulebook).
8. The European Cup races/categories have preference/priority. It is not possible

to cancel European Cup races and instead to start races of non-European Cup categories.

9. The official distances of the Sports Rules have to be chosen for European Cup short/long distances.
10. The award ceremony must be started on Sunday until 6 pm (this is the latest moment).
11. If any skater cannot participate at the award ceremony he must announce this to the Technical Commission member present at this stage.
12. If the skater is not participating at the ceremony, he will lose all his points from this event.

71.5 Prize money

1. In order to increase the prize money, organizers will do their best in looking for sponsors, with the assistance of Technical Commission.
2. This matter will be coordinated by the Technical Commission with the organizers.
3. Prize money has to be claimed personally by the qualified skaters on the official Technical Commission form (declaration of tax) and has to be sent to Technical Commission.
4. Unclaimed prize money will be put in the prize money of the following year.
5. For the prize money there will be no ex aequo.

If skaters have the same amount of points in the final ranking, the winner is the skater who was in the better position/ranking in the last stage (first criteria), in the stage they all have taken part (second criteria).

6. The payment will be done by World Skate Europe by bank transfer after the last stage.

71.6 Ranking

Data: Before, during and at the end of the event, all data must be sent to the webmaster (ec-webmaster@c-webdesign.net) to be uploaded on the EC website. Questions about results: e-mail to results@europeancupinline.eu

Rankings: Separate rankings for short distance and long distance races will be prepared after each event. A skater may participate in short and long distance races (no rankings per team).

Points will be assigned as follows: 30 points to the 1st skater, 29 points to the 2nd one and so on; 1 point for participation to all ranked skaters.

Increase of 0,1 point to the first skaters just to mark the winners.

If skaters have the same amount of points in the stage ranking, the winner is the skater who was in the better position/ranking in the last distance.

For the final EC stage the maximum of points will be 30 (it doesn't depend on the number of skaters).

Final ranking: Each skater must participate in at least five (5) events if he or she wants to take part in the overall ranking (best 7 - maximum the best 7 races will be accounted).

71.7 Medals

The World Skate Europe will supply medals for the first 3 skaters of each ranking/category in the tournament. The cost of the medals and the payment of the prize money is up to the World Skate Europe. There will be no medals given for the final ranking of the overall tournament.

71.8 Organizer fee:

An organizing fee (see Annex 1) has to be paid to World Skate Europe at least 2 months before the event with all the corresponding documents. The major part of this sum will create prize money to be assigned on the basis of the final ranking.

71.9 Inscription fee

An inscription fee (see Annex 1) has to be paid to the organizer of the stage.

71.10 Technical rules

The World Skate rules will be applied.

71.11 Event composition

Types of races:

Competitions must schedule, in each event, two (2) sprint races and two long distance races. Every day, there will be one short distance race (up to 1.000 m) and one long distance race.

Races cannot be changed during the running of the event; in case of adverse weather conditions, rankings can be made on one race only.

Each organizer may decide for any other category (outside of the European Cup), like Masters or Beginners (up to 12 years old).

71.12 Judges

Each organization will send World Skate Europe Speed Technical Commission the list of necessary and available judges, with the name of the suggested Chief Referee. The Technical Commission can change the Chief Referee; in that case the travelling expenses

will be up to Technical Commission.

The organizers must pay boarding, lodging and travel expenses of judges. Special arrangements are possible.

71.13 Technical equipment

Technical equipment: each organizer must have a photo finish system.

71.14 Anti-doping control

Anti-doping control according to rules in force of the National Federation in the hosting country. Anti-doping controls have to be executed (compulsory); expenses paid by the organizer or the National Federation of the hosting country.

5.4 East European Cup

72. Specific rules for the East European Cup

The East European Cup is an official European series of the WSE. This series is located in the East of Europe and will have one cross over stage with the European Cup. This series has its own regulations and applies the WS technical rules.

72.1 Duration: Days of competition: three (maximum) for each event.

72.2 Participation:

- All European skaters provided they are authorized by their corresponding National Federation which is affiliated to the ESTC;
- All skaters from other Continental Federations affiliated with WSK may participate in the East European Cup (on invitation by the organizers).

72.3 Categories:

Junior C (A Junior C skater is aged 12 at December 31st of the year of the competition), Cadet, Youth and Junior.

72.4 Event Organization

1. Organizers are authorized to use World Skate Europe logo and must hoist World Skate Europe flag in the sports venue.
2. The World Skate Europe Technical Commission will attend every event with its own delegate, one (1) delegate at the final event, being the board and lodging expenses up to the local organizer.
3. Board and lodging expenses of other World Skate Europe attending members will be World Skate Europe responsibility.
4. An official representative of the national federation has to be present at the stage.
5. Insurance: each participant must have his own personal insurance. At the same time, organizers too must have an insurance against third party.
6. The World Skate Europe provides a template for the announcement of the stage. The template must be used by the organizer (unity of announcements and in accordance with the rulebook).
7. The East European Cup races/categories have preference/priority. It is not possible to cancel East European Cup races and instead to start races of on-East European Cup categories.
8. Youth and Cadet: the official distances of the Sports Rules have to be chosen for East European Cup short/long distances (two short and two long distances).

9. 11 and 12 years old skaters: the official distances of the Federation of the country in which the stage is located have to be chosen for East European Cup distances (four distances).
10. In combined European Cup/East European Cup stages there is no separate East European Cup award ceremony.
11. In combined European Cup/East European Cup stages the chosen distances of the European Cup are also the distances for the East European Cup.
12. The award ceremony must be started on Sunday until 6 p.m. (this is the latest moment).
13. If any skater can not participate at the award ceremony he must announce this to the ESTC member present at this stage.
14. If the skater is not participating at the ceremony, he will lose all his points from this event.

72.5 Prize money

1. In order to increase the prize money, organizers will do their best in looking for sponsors, with the assistance of the ESTC.
2. This matter will be coordinated by the ESTC with the organizers.
3. Prize money has to be claimed personally by the qualified skaters on the official ESTC form (declaration of tax) and has to be sent to the ESTC.
4. Unclaimed prize money will be put in the prize money of the following year.
5. For the prize money there will be no ex aequo.

If skaters have the same amount of points in the final ranking, the winner is the skater who was in the better position/ranking in the last stage (first criteria), in the stage they all have taken part (second criteria).

6. Payment will be done by the ESTC by bank transfer after the last stage.

72.6 Ranking Data

As soon as possible after an stage but at least at 4 PM on the first workingday following on the stage weekend the results per category must be sent to lida.krupkova@gmail.com in an Excel file in the following columns:

1. Overall ranking
2. BIB number
3. Surname and Last Name *both and in order are important, so there cannot be doubled athletes !!*
4. Club
5. Nation
6. Sum of points overall
7. Race 1 (distance) rank+time

8. Race 2 (distance) rank+time
9. Race 3 (distance) rank+time
10. Race 4 (distance) rank+time

This excel file with columns is one the German software provides als an output.

Most, maybe all, organizers use this software for their races.

Intermediate results after each stage of the East European Cup will be published on an EEC website section East European Cup. This will be done as soon as possible but at least at 4 PM on the Wednesday after the weekend of last EEC-stage until then. Necessary for this publication of intermediate results is the receive of the stage results at least on the day after the last stage. For all stages on Monday and for Wörgl on Tuesday following on the stage. The planned moment of publication of the Final results of the EEC 2020 is September 15th 2020.

Questions about results:

Rankings:

At an East European Cup stage all skaters in the races and in the total ranking for the categories mentioned in Art. 236 participate in the East European Cup ranking for that stage.

The intermediate East European Cup ranking will be prepared after each event. It is an overall ranking and there is no difference between short and long distances.

Points will be assigned as follows: 20 points to the 1st skater, 19 points to the 2nd one and so on; 1 point for participation to all ranked skaters. Increase of 0,1 point to the first skaters just to mark the winners.

If skaters have the same amount of points in the stage ranking, the winner is the skater who was in the better position/ranking in the longest distance.

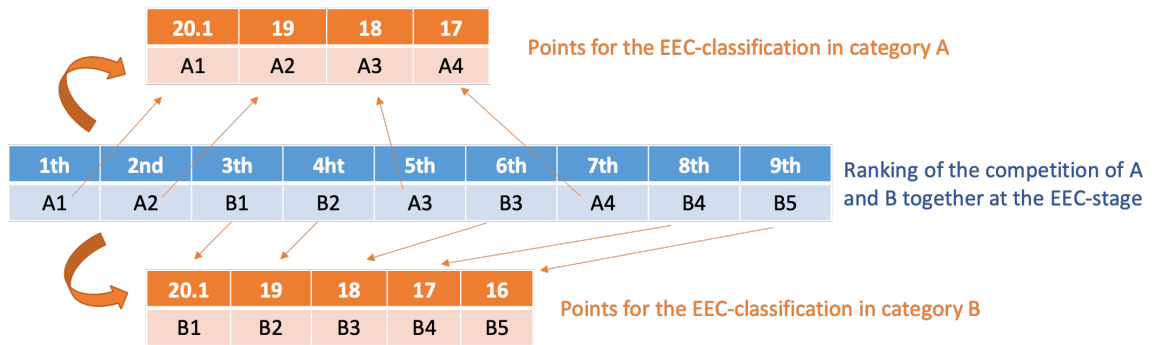

For a combined European Cup/East European Cup the EEC category ranking is an overall ranking for all distances in a category at that stage.

The organisation committee of a stage can decide to combine two categories together.

The decision has to be communicated to coaches and skaters before the start of the first race on that stage. Only reason for a combination category is the number of skaters if it is too few to have an own competition. The end ranking of the combined competition (category A and category B) will results in two separate rankings for the East European Cup.

One for category A and one for category B. See figure below:



Final ranking:

Each skater must participate in at least four (4) stages if he or she wants to take part in the overall final ranking. The best five (5) stages of the seven (7) stages will be accounted.

72.7 Medals

The World Skate Europe will supply medals for the first 3 skaters of each ranking/category in the tournament. The cost of the medals and the payment of the prize money is up to the World Skate Europe. There will be no medals given for the final ranking of the overall tournament.

72.8 Organizer fee

An organizing fee (see Annex 1) has to be paid to ESTC at least 2 months before the event with all the corresponding documents. The major part of this sum will create prize money to be assigned on the basis of the final ranking.

72.9 Inscription fee

An inscription fee (see Annex 1) has to be paid to the organizer of the stage.

72.10 Technical rules

The World Skate rules will be applied.

72.11 Event composition

Types of races: Competitions must schedule, in each event, two (2) sprint races and two long distance races. Every day, there will be one short distance race (up to 1.000 m) and one long distance race.

In East European Cup stages only the organiser may decided to combine the distances

to one competition with at least three distances (two short and one long).

Races cannot be changed during the running of the event; in case of adverse weather conditions, rankings can be made on one race only.

Each organizer may decide for any other category (outside of the East European Cup), like Masters or Beginners (up to 10 years old).

72.12 Disqualification

In East European Cup, if a skater is disqualified for sports fault in one race, he is not ranked in this race and obtains a penalty of 99 points for overall ranking for that stage. No suspension for next race in the stage.

In combined European Cup/ East European Cup stages if a skater is disqualified for sports fault in one race in short distance (up to 1.000 m) or long distance (over 1.000 m), he will be blocked for the next race in the stage in short or in long distance.

5.5 Cadet Challenge

73. Specific rules for the Cadet Challenge

The Cadet Challenge is organized during one stage of the European Cup.

73.1 Categories:

The Cadet Challenge is organized for cadets (men and women) only.

73.2 Races

All races have to take place on track. Official distances are the following: 300 m Time Trial - 500+m Sprint - 3.000 m Points - 5.000 m Elimination.

73.3 Medals

The World Skate Europe will supply medals for the first 3 skaters of each ranking/category in the tournament.

5.6 European Records

74. Validation

The Technical Commission recognizes and validates European records, set on current official European Speed Championship distances as by program and during World/European Championships or World Games.

75. Records

The following records are recognized:

- men track races
- women track races
- men road circuit races
- women road circuit races

76. Requirements

In order to have a record recognized, it is necessary to proceed accordingly to all the items of this Rulebook and to have electronic timekeeping.

77. Documentation

When a record is set, the Organizing Federation of the World or Continental championship or World Games where the result has been obtained must notify the Technical Commission within sixty (60) days, the following information:

- a. date when the record has been set;
- b. Minutes bearing the signatures of the Chief Judge and the judges who attended the competition. The minutes must include the list of times achieved and must be undersigned by the Official Timekeeper of the competition. When the records are set on a track or on a closed circuit, this list shall specify the total times and the times achieved for each lap around the track. The minutes must indicate where the competition was held, the day and hour, the name of the skater who set the record.

With this signature, the competition Chief Judge certifies that all the items of the Technical Commission Regulations have been respected and that those who sign the minutes have really acknowledged the times registered by the Timekeepers with the corresponding tape or electronic recording.

Together with the minutes, it is necessary to enclose the following:

- a. plan of the competition course, prepared by the competent technical office of the locality, indicating the course length, starting point, finish line and the exact number of laps determining the distance;
- b. a list of the skaters, in order of arrival, who took part in the competition during which the record was set;
- c. certificate of nationality of the skater who set the record;
- d. certification specifying that the doping control has been carried out.

78. Publication

The Technical Commission must inform to all the World Skate member Federations about the changes made in the list of the records. This shall take place through publication in the World Skate website.

79. Official Track

Official tracks certified by World Skate are defined art 108.

80. Ranking of the previous European Championship

The previous WSE ranking (art 69) is used for the composition of the start order. The nations who did not participate at the previous European Championships complete the ranking using the alphabetic order in English.

81. Planning and warm-up

Before each race, a warm-up of six (6) minutes is accorded to the skaters who are going to race. The Official Speaker announces the last minute.

82. Sprint races heats composition

The heats will be made up according to the ranking of the nations of the previous European Championship (art 69) and the serpentine system.

83. Track 200 m Dual time trial

Qualification heats (first round). Heats will be made up according to the ranking of the nations of the previous European Championship (art 69). The best twelve (12) times are qualified for the final.

In case of insufficient number of skaters, eight (8) best time are qualified.

The heats of the final will be made according to the times obtained in qualification: Heat 1 (11th/12th), Heat 2 (9th /10th) and so on. The winner is the best time of the final.

Technical requirements: Two (2) photo finish timing systems, one (1) per line. Photocells that indicate the unofficial partial times. An electronic Start Gun connected to the two (2) systems to make them start at the same time. Moreover, two (2) amplifiers, one near each start line, connected to the Gun.

84. Sprint races (100 m, 500 m +D, One lap & 1.000 m)

Qualification heats (first round). The heats will be made up according to the ranking of the nations of the previous World Championship (art 69).

- During the first round, only best time are qualified (except for 1.000 m. sprint).
- Start line: For all the rounds, the skaters are called and choose their position on the start line according the start line order (art 135.2, art 135.3 WS Rulebook).

85. Constitution of the qualification heats for the long-distance race

If, for the following races; Elimination race, Point Race and Points-Elimination race, the number of skaters need the organization of qualification heats, they are organized as follows:

The composition should be made according the ranking of the nations, as follows:

- a. the nations with three (3) skaters are drawn first. The skaters of a same nation cannot be in the same qualification heat;
- b. the nations with two (2) skaters are drawn next.
- c. The nations with only one (1) skater are drawn at the end. They complete the heat according to the ranking of the nation and serpentine method.
- d. There will be no loser's final. Unqualified skaters are ranked according to the result(place) obtained in the qualification heat.
- e. Qualification heats shall be skated with at least 50 % of the race distance.
